Skills Training, in Support of **Section 51 of the Forests Ordinance 2015** (S'wak Cap. 71)

as a Forest Management Unit (FMU), these companies' in Forest Operations; Demonstrate Knowledge of efforts in having more of their workmen trained and Forest Planting Site Preparation; and the 5 PFAs. assessed as competent is commendable.

During the Session, presentations were delivered by Ms Annie Ting, the Acting Joint Group Chief Executive Officer cum Senior Manager of STA, the Trainers/Assessors as well as Training Officer of STAT. The presentations covered the background of STAT skills training for the five (5) PFA and STAT Database System. Ms Wilhelmina Cluny, Research Officer of FDS also presented on Sustainable Forest Management and Requirement for the Trained Workmen.

Twenty one (21) officers i.e. Forest Conservationists, Forests Guards and Ground Operators of the Training Unit of FDS from various regions in Sarawak participated in the subsequent two-and-a-half day Briefing.

The Trainers/Assessors from STAT presented generic units of both Natural Forest and Planted Forest such as General Induction on Forest Operations; Demonstrate Knowledge of Environmental Requirements

These presentations also covered the importance of being equipped with full Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and awareness of reducing impact to the environment during all forestry operations.

Apart from classroom presentations, a demonstration session on PPE was also conducted by the Trainers/ Assessors of STAT for the participants, particularly on the proper method and practice in handling a chainsaw.

At the end of the event, Mr Afriezul bin Abdul Rahman, Senior Executive Forester of FDS expressed his appreciation to STAT for organising the event. He hoped that the cooperation between FDS and STAT will continue after the event and for the furtherance of goals such as formation of the Trained Workmen Advisory Working Group and implementation of verification process from April 2019 onwards.

The Natural Resources and Environment Board (NREB) both the NREB and STA in the 1st Pilot Projects to address and Sarawak Timber Association (STA) have jointly the issue of irrelevant or overlapping EIA Approval Terms conducted a series of Preparatory Meetings for the seven and Conditions.
