Did you also know that....

Malaysia ranked 61 out of 180 countries assessed in year 2018 by Transparency International, a global civil society organisation leading the fight against corruption, for its Corruption Perception Index 2018. The score, retained at 47 out of 100 points saw Malaysia moving a spot higher from the previous year. Among ASEAN countries, Malaysia is among the top three after Singapore (ranked 3rd) and Brunei (ranked 31st) and ranked above Indonesia (ranked 89th) and Vietnam (ranked 117th).
